We will use native deer grass (*Muhlenbergia*), or rush (*Juncus*), to begin a bowl-shaped basket suitable for holding fruit or dough-rising. As binder, we will use peeled and unpeeled willow which run continuously along the coil, exchanging places to create a pattern. Seen in the photograph is a Spanish-style dough basket. Charlie is active in native habitat restoration in Marin, managing several projects for Friends of Corte Madera Creek Watershed.
